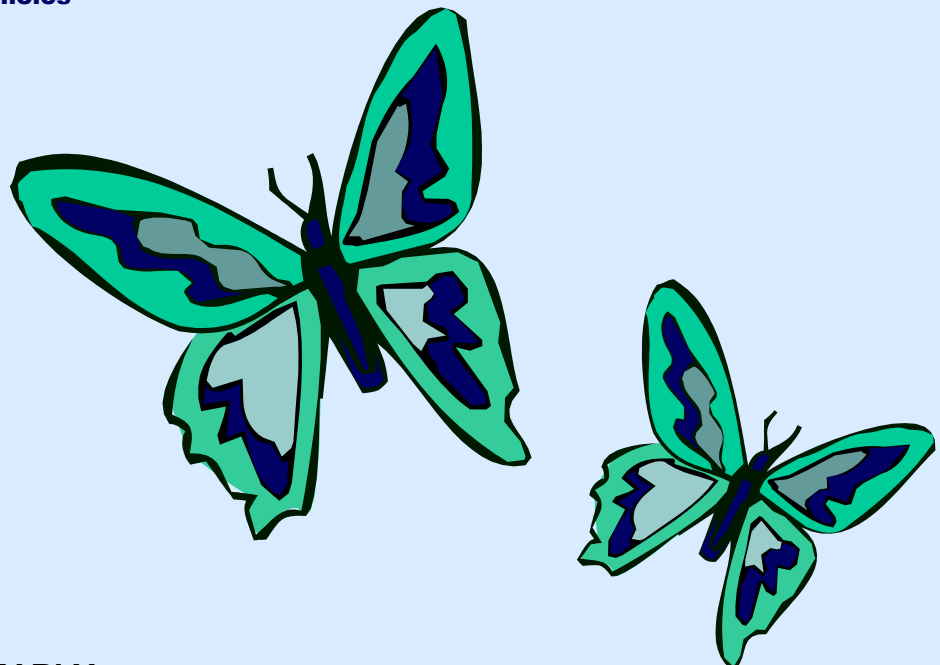

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# REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS

**OCTOBER 30 - NOVEMBER 13, 2003  
SPRING 2004**

All currently registered students who expect to return to CSB/SJU this Spring must complete advance registration by November 13<sup>th</sup>. Please follow these instructions carefully—proper registration is your responsibility. If you have any questions about registration, call the Registrar's Office at 5260 (CSB) or 3396 (SJU).

## STUDENTS ARE ELIGIBLE TO REGISTER ONLY IF THEY HAVE:

- Met with their advisor to obtain their Label with Registration PIN #
- Settled all current charges with the Student Accounts Office
- Been accepted by a department (unless they are a first-year student)
- Complied with Minnesota immunization regulations
- Have an active Network account

We strongly urge you to meet with your advisor early and enter your registration on WEBSTER on the date listed on your PIN Label. **Registration is on-line—delaying your registration will affect course selection.**

Students who are ineligible to register for any of these reasons may register on WEBSTER after they have cleared all registration holds.

Please note that registration for ILPs (Individualized Learning Projects) and for special programs (Tri-College Exchange, Internships, etc.) requires your submission of special forms available from the Registrar's Office or they are available on-line. Registration for Internships (8 credits or more) are due the first day of classes.

## REGISTRATION ADJUSTMENTS

Registration adjustments (Drop/Add) can be done on WEBSTER through January 15<sup>th</sup>. **You will need your Registration PIN# that you received from your Advisor.** To drop a course after this date, students can come to the Registrar's Office at SJU (Quad 161) or at CSB (Academic Services Building 208).

Listings of canceled or closed courses will be electronically updated on the Class Schedule Information on WEBSTER. Students should use WEBSTER to check whether a space has become available in a course that was previously closed. Courses may be added through the first 4 class days of the semester.

If a course is closed, check whether there are any other sections of the same course that have spaces available in them and register for an alternate section. If this option is not available to you, consider alternate courses and register accordingly. Your advisor is a good resource to help determine an appropriate alternate. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the department chair or instructor to "override" a student beyond the course limit. Override registrations are completed by the student presenting a signed (department chair or instructor, as appropriate) Drop/Add card to the Registrar's Office.

We also ask that you use the "Request for Additional Course Spaces" menu item on WEBSTER registration to report a course that you wished to take but were unable to enroll in any section of. Your reporting this will help the colleges plan for possible limit changes or additional sections of the course—both for this semester and for future semesters. Please do not report a course if you were able to register for an alternate section of the same course. This request DOES NOT place you on a waiting list for the course.

## REGISTRATION PRIORITY AND COURSE SELECTION

Registration priority is based first on class standing, then on the last four digits of your Social Security Number. Seniors are assigned courses first, then juniors, sophomores and first-year students. Class standing is determined by earned credits, not by years in college. For Spring Semester registration, the highest (9999) four digits have the highest priority. You are encouraged to keep these priorities in mind when you develop your course requests. **WEBSTER will immediately respond to your course selection by indicating Enrolled or Closed.**

# Instructions for Using WEBSTER

## AT ANY NETWORKED PC:

Log on to the PC (your username and password)  
Click on the START button  
Select NETWORK PROGRAMS  
Select INTERNET BROWSERS  
Click on INTERNET EXPLORER  
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>  
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

## FROM OTHER PC'S THAT HAVE ACCESS TO A WEB BROWSER:

Sign on as you normally would  
Select Internet Explorer as your browser (AOL will not work)  
Enter <http://www.csbsju.edu/>  
The CSB/SJU HOMEPAGE displays

- Click on **"Inside CSB/SJU"**. Then choose the **"A to Z Index"** and under the **"W"** click on **"WEBSTER"**
- Click on the **Spring term ONLINE Registration Login Icon**
- **At the Registration Login Screen**, Click on the box and **Enter your Student ID # (with no spaces or dashes) & Enter your PIN #** in the space labeled "PIN" (**PIN # is on the PIN Label you received from your advisor - Do not use your WSC**)  
Click on the **Login** button **once**
- **At the Registration Login Verification Screen**  
Click on the box and **Enter your PIN# again** & then click on the **Login** button **once**
- Click on **Spring Term Registration** – from the Main Registration Menu  
Click on **Spring 2004** and then click on the **Select Term** button
- **To Enter your Spring Term Registration:**  
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**  
**Enter the 5 digit Call #'s for all of the courses you want to register for - call numbers are listed next to the course number in the Spring Class Schedule Booklet.** Click on **Submit Registration** button - **you must click on this for your registration to be entered into the computer system.** If there is space in the courses you selected and if you meet the necessary prerequisites, the screen will display **"Registered Successfully"**. It will also display the Course ID, Credits and Title of the courses that you have registered for. If a class is closed or you do not meet the prerequisite the screen will display **"Class Registration failed with error" and a reason for the error.**
- **To change the credits on a Variable Credit Course:**  
Click on **Change Course Credit**  
**Enter the number of credits** in the box (select from the range displayed) & click on **Submit Changes**
- **To check course availability:**  
Click on **Look-up Class to Add**  
Click on the name of the **Subject** and Click on **Select Subject** button  
Click on the **Department and Course Number** and Click on **Select Course** button  
**This will display all the sections of that course, and under "status" it will state "open" or "closed"**  
(Note: You may **not** be able to register for some courses that are "open" because you do not meet the prerequisite or quota restrictions for that course.)
- **To request a course that you were unable to enroll in any section of:**  
Click on **Request for Additional Course Spaces** - from Student Registration Menu  
Enter the **5 digit Call # of the course(s) you were not able to enroll in** (this request DOES NOT place you on a waiting list for the course).  
Click on **Submit**  
**The screen will display "Courses Requested" or "Course Request Failed" and a reason**
- **To change your Spring Registration:**  
Click on **ADD/DROP Courses**  
Click on the **down arrow in the Action Box** of the course you want to Drop  
Click on **DROP**  
Under **ADD Class fill in the Call #** of the new course you want to Add  
Click on **Submit Registration Button - this will drop your course and add a new one at the same time. Keep your Registration PIN # - you may Drop/Add for Spring semester until January 15th.**
- **To send a copy of your Course Requests to the printer:**  
Click on **File** from Menu Bar  
Select **Print** & Click on **OK**
- **To sign off:**  
Click on **Exit WEBSTER**

**If you took a course at another college which is a required prerequisite of a CSB/SJU course, you MUST contact the Registrar's Office to be registered**

## PLEASE NOTE:

If you have trouble operating the computer terminal when attempting to enter your Fall Term registration, please (1) **ask for assistance from the Computer access student employee**, or (2) **contact the Office of the Registrar**. The students who staff the Access Areas have been trained on the use of WEBSTER and are ready to respond to questions you may have while entering your registration information.

## DROP/ADD on WEBSTER

If you would like to drop and add courses for Spring Term 2004 you may do this through WEBSTER until January 15<sup>th</sup>. Please keep your Registration PIN #, you will need this to Drop/Add on WEBSTER. After this date you will need to drop and add courses in the Registrar's Office.

## OBTAINING A NETWORK ACCOUNT

All students must have a NETWORK account to use WEBSTER from the Network PC's on campus. Most of you will already have an account, which you may use for many other functions besides course registration. If you do not have a Network account--or have forgotten your password or how to sign on--please follow these steps to obtain your Network account:

- Step #1:** Go the Computing Center at SJU, Quad 084, from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm
- Step #2:** Identify yourself as needing a Network account.
- Step #3:** Activate your account on one of the PC's in the computing center

**PROBLEMS** -- Discussed below are some common problems we expect some of you may encounter, and how you may solve them.

- **Your PIN # doesn't work.**  
**Solution:** Re-check your label and carefully re-enter the PIN #. You may have to Exit WEBSTER completely and login again. **YOUR PIN# for registration is not the same as your WSC (Webster Security Code) that you use to access Student Information on WEBSTER**  
 Please note: the PIN # is not displayed (for security reasons) as you enter it on the computer.
- **You lost your PIN #.**  
**Solution:** Contact your Advisor to get your Pin Number again, or bring your Advisor's signature to the Registrar's Office. (PIN #'s cannot be obtained in the Computer Access Areas)
- **You entered the wrong Call #.**  
**Solution:** WEBSTER allows you to make changes to your registration. See the section on changing your spring registration in the "Instructions for using WEBSTER". You may make changes on WEBSTER through January 15<sup>th</sup>.
- **While using WEBSTER it displays: "This session for your Login has expired".**  
**Solution:** WEBSTER is programmed to Log off of the Registration Screen if you **leave the screen idle for more than 2 minutes**. If this should this happen, simply sign on again. To do so, click on WEBSTER and then click on the Spring Registration icon and start over.
- **WEBSTER shows the status of a course as 'open' but it will not permit you to register for the course.**  
**Solution:** You may not meet the prerequisites or quota restrictions for that course. Check the notes in the class schedule under that course or contact the Registrar's Office.

# ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

## ACADEMIC ADVISING

After receiving this Class Schedule booklet, visit your academic advisor to arrange a program of classes for next term, and have your advisor place your PIN label on the Class Request Worksheet located on the back page of your Spring 2004 Class Schedule Booklet.

If you intend to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. Overloads may be attempted only by students in good academic standing, and overloads of 20 or more credits require the student to see the Academic Advising Office.

## AUDITING

Students intending to audit a course (earn no credit) should indicate their intent when registering for the course, or complete a Drop/Add card and file it with the Registrar's Office during the first week of class. Auditors are expected to attend all regular classes, but they are not required to take final exams. A student who first registers for credit may change to auditor status any time during the first month of class. A student who first enrolls for auditor status may change to credit status only during the first week of class. Courses audited are not included in determining the total credits earned; however, the credit value of any course audited is computed in the assessment of tuition.

## ADDING A CLASS

**Thursday, January 15th** is the last day you may ADD a full-term course to your program, unless the course's first meeting is scheduled after January 15<sup>th</sup>. No student may enroll for a full-term course after the second scheduled meeting without the instructor's consent.

## DROPPING A CLASS

- **Feb. 4th** Last day to receive a permanent drop on your schedule
- **Apr. 5<sup>th</sup>** Last day to receive a "W" on your transcript. If you withdraw after this date, your instructor will assign you an "F" at the end of the semester.

For courses scheduled for less than a full term, withdrawal during the first third of the course will result in no record entry; during the second third, a "W" entry; during the final third, a failure.

## EXEMPTION/SUBSTITUTION

In exceptional circumstances students may petition for exemption/substitution from specific academic regulations. Forms for requesting an exemption/substitution are available from the Registrar's Office. Students should first consult with their academic advisor, whose signature on the exemption/substitution form represents a recommendation that the request be considered favorably by the approving official. Department chairs are the approving officials for exemptions/substitutions from requirements within majors and minors. Exemptions/substitutions from academic regulations beyond major and minor fields require the approval of the assistant academic dean. Requests for these non-departmental exemptions/substitutions should be directed to the Academic Advising Offices. The guiding principle in considering requests for any exemption/substitution is fidelity to the academic standards of the colleges.

## INDIVIDUAL LEARNING PROJECTS

The guidelines and application forms for Individual Learning Projects, sometimes called Independent Study, are available in the Registrar's Office. If you are planning an ILP for Spring term, please consult these guidelines. Remember, only 4 credits of ILP per term are allowed. You may indicate your intent to register for an ILP by requesting DNA 271 01A **Call #10321**, or DNA 371-01A, **Call #10322** on WEBSTER. Remember to indicate the number of credits. First-year students are not eligible for ILPs.

## POLICY ON INCOMPLETE GRADE

The policy concerning the temporary grade Incomplete (I) includes the following points:

When circumstances warrant, instructors may allow some delay in the completion of course work. Such extensions shall not extend beyond the close of the following regular (fall or spring) semester, and earlier limits may be set at the discretion of the instructor.

The instructor must report on the official grade roster the grade "I" followed by the approximate grade the student will receive if the course work is not complete by the end of the following semester (e.g., IF, or IC, or IB). That grade will be used in the computation of grade point averages until the Incomplete is removed.

If by the end of the following semester the instructor reports a single final grade to the Registrar, that grade will replace the I/GRADE, the Incomplete will be removed, and averages recomputed accordingly. Otherwise the provisional grade that was assigned with the "I" will become a permanent part of the transcript.

Exceptions to the above may be granted only by the written permission of the Assistant Academic Dean. Such exceptions will ordinarily be granted only in cases of medical disability or problems of comparable seriousness.

**Degree candidates are cautioned that failure to have all degree requirements satisfied (including removal of Incomplete grades in courses needed for graduation) by the reasonable dates set by the Registrar will necessarily result in postponement of their graduation.**

## INTERNSHIPS

All CSB/SJU students who plan to do an Internship for 4 or more credits during the Summer or Fall of 2004 must enroll in the Pre-Internship Seminar. The January Pre-Internship Seminar--open to juniors and seniors only--meets during A mod, 8:00 am at SJU, or 2:40 pm at CSB. The seminar is for no credit. If you wish to sign up for the seminar or if you have questions about other options, contact the Internship Office, Academic Services Building, phone 5799. **ALL STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND TWO ADDITIONAL SESSIONS: 1) LEGAL ISSUES OF INTERNSHIPS and 2) REGISTRATION AND REQUIREMENTS. CHECK WITH THE INTERNSHIP OFFICE FOR EXACT DATES.** The last day to register for an 8 credit spring internship is January 12th. The last day to register for a 4 credit spring internship is January 15th.

You may indicate your intent to register for an Internship by requesting DNA 397-01A, **Call #10323** through WEBSTER. Remember to indicate the number of credits.

## SUMMER INTERNSHIPS

All internships which take place during the summer must be registered under the Summer term rather than under either the preceding Spring semester or the following Fall semester. This policy will be strictly enforced for the 2004 Summer.

The last day to register for a Summer Internship is Friday, May 7<sup>th</sup>. Registration after this date requires approval of the Assistant Academic Dean. You must have taken the Pre-internship seminar. If you have not done so contact Julie Christle, phone 5799 for information on alternative meetings.

Please contact Jill Farry, Director of Internships (Academic Services Center, Phone 5799), for information regarding special tuition structures for Summer Internships.

## MODULAR SCHEDULING

Some departments offer courses of less than a full term's length; these courses begin and end according to the following dates and are called Modules, or "Mods". Each Mod is nine regular teaching periods and will be listed by the codes below in the Official Class Schedule:

## ON TRACK

Advisors will have access to their advisees' On Track advising aid through WEB for Faculty or the BARRY Advising System. Please make an appointment to meet with your advisor early to review your academic progress and select your Spring coursework. Remember, all students MUST see their advisor to receive their WEBSTER Registration PIN # Label.

## OVERLOAD

If you plan to register for more than 18 credits, you are incurring an overload. The overload tuition fee is estimated at \$565.00 per credit over 18. Students whose cumulative grade point average is below 2.00 may not register for an overload. Students in good academic standing (GPA above 2.00) may register for a maximum of 1 overload credit (19 credits overall) without permission. Credit totals of 20 or more require the student to see the Academic Advising Office. The WEBSTER registration system will not allow you to register for more than 19 credits.



## REPEATING A COURSE

A course that has been failed may be repeated for credit. Courses that have been passed may not be repeated for credit. They may, however, be repeated for additional honor points. The original grade is not removed when the course is repeated and credit for a course can be earned only once. The higher grade is computed in the GPA. If you are registering for a course that you are repeating you **MUST** notify the Registrar's Office.

## STUDENT TEACHING

Students registering for student teaching (EDUC 361, 362, 363) in their 9<sup>th</sup> (or greater) semester as a full-time student at CSB/SJU will be billed at ½ the regular tuition rate for that semester. These students will also not be charged the student activity fee, technology fee, and campus center fee for that semester. Institutional gift aid (scholarships/grants) will not be available to these students.

## STUDY ABROAD

CSB and SJU offer a number of group overseas study programs. Students who plan to enroll in one of these programs should contact the Center for International Education, QUAD 128 at SJU. Students who are considering enrolling in coursework offered abroad by another institution (Consortium/External Study Abroad) should contact the International Education Office or the Registrar's Office, for information on transfer of credits. Students who register for SA 372, Consortium/External Study Abroad, will be billed a \$175 fee

Seniors must ordinarily be in residence for the two semesters immediately preceding commencement (graduation). "In residence" is defined as enrollment as a full-time student at CSB/SJU for a minimum of 12 credits per semester. Any student wishing to register for a External Study Abroad Consortium during one of their two last semesters of their Senior year must receive approval from the Academic Advising Office. Seniors will **not** be allowed to register for a year long External Study Abroad Consortium.

## S/U REGISTRATION

Arrangements for this non-honor point grading option should be made with your professor at the beginning of the course. Remember that undergraduates are limited in the number and types of courses they may take for the grade S (Satisfactory). See the Catalog for specific rules. First-year students may not take the S/U option except for a course with only S/U grades available. The grade S, once turned in by the instructor, is **NOT SUBJECT TO LATER CHANGE**.

Grading options are listed in the Class Schedule as either GRADING OPTION A-F REQUIRED or GRADING OPTION S-U REQUIRED. If neither of these is listed, the instructor will permit eligible students to choose either option by the date the instructor specifies at the beginning of the course. Once you have chosen, you may not request that the S/U be changed to an honor point grade.

If coursework grades average below a C under the S/U option, the grade U (Unsatisfactory) will be given with no credit earned.

## TRI-COLLEGE EXCHANGE

The College of Saint Benedict, Saint John's University, and Saint Cloud State University have an agreement that encourages regular full-time undergraduate students to take courses on any of the three campuses. Registration is limited to fall and spring semesters. If you are interested in taking courses at Saint Cloud State, you can pick up a copy of their Class Schedule and a registration application at the Registrar's Office. If a course seems suitable for your program of studies, see your advisor for permission to register. To register, file the approved application with the Registrar's Office at the St. John's campus before January 2<sup>nd</sup>. The course will be added to your Spring 2004 Student Detail Schedule, if space is available.

CSB/SJU students will be billed tuition, and other fees, at CSB/SJU rates. If a student is not registered for more than 18 total credits, there will ordinarily be no additional charge. For credits over 18, an additional tuition charge of \$565.00 (estimate), will be made for each additional semester credit hour.

## TRANSCRIPT SERVICE

Current students may request an unofficial copy of their transcript at no charge from the Registrar's Office. Official transcript requests must be submitted in writing to the Registrar's Office and may be picked up at the Registrar's Office (or we can mail them for you) 2-3 working days after the request is made, except during the first and last week of each term.

Former students may request a transcript copy for \$3.00 per transcript. The fee for faxing a transcript will be \$3.00 per transcript. If the transcript is faxed outside the U.S. the fee will be a minimum of \$5.00. All transcript requests must be submitted in writing via mail or fax and payment must accompany the order.

## WITHDRAWAL FROM COLLEGE

Complete withdrawal from all of your courses during the term must be initiated with your Residential Director at CSB, Mary Commons 221 or the Residential Life Office, Sexton 127 at SJU. If you withdraw by February 4<sup>th</sup> no official record of your registration for that term will be made. If you withdraw between February 5<sup>th</sup> and April 5<sup>th</sup>, the mark "W" will appear behind that term's courses on your transcript. If you withdraw after April 5<sup>th</sup>, all courses for that term will be followed by the grade of "F". If you decide to withdraw after the term ends, you **MUST** notify the office mentioned above.

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MINNESOTA STUDENTS ELIGIBLE FOR THE MINNESOTA GRANT PROGRAM:

You must register for a minimum of 15 credits each semester to receive a Minnesota Grant at the full-time student rate. Students who register for 12-14 credits may still receive a Minnesota Grant but the award amount will be substantially reduced. Please direct any questions to the Financial Aid Office at CSB or SJU. (For all other aid programs, 12 credits is still considered full-time.)

The academic calendar concludes each semester with a one-day study and four-day test cycle. Faculty may administer final exams for their classes only during the exam periods officially scheduled by the Registrar's Office. Cumulative final examinations may not be given during the regularly scheduled class days of the semester. If there is to be a cumulative final exam in a course, all exams given during the semester must be returned for student review by the last scheduled day of class.

Instructors of each full-term course are expected to announce at the beginning of the course whether a written two-hour final examination will be given. Such an exam will be administered during the four-day test cycle according to the schedule above. Note that a class is assigned a test time and day in the schedule according to the cycle and time period it meets during the semester. Classes that meet after Period V may use their last regularly scheduled class period for a final exam.

One period has been reserved on each of the four test days for the administration of a common exam for multiple-section courses who so desire. A list of such courses, and their exam times, will be announced this fall. The legend, MS, in the accompanying chart signifies times set aside for these multi-section common exams.

## COMMUNICATION

### COMM 308: Rhetoric of Advertising

Many critics argue that commercial advertising works not only to sell us things, but also to create structures of meaning that shape how we view the world. This course examines the rhetorical function of advertising—how images and arguments function to persuade audiences. The course also examines the social and environmental consequences of consumerism. Students will carefully examine both print and broadcast advertising. Evaluation will be through oral presentations, class discussion, examinations, and a research paper.

**FEE:** \$25.00

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 101 or COMM 103 or permission of instructor.

### COMM 309: Environmental Rhetoric

This course examines environmental communication, focusing on how public participants (movement leaders, corporations, scientific experts, politicians, reporters, citizens and others) attempt to define and articulate environmental issues for mass audiences through speeches, news, advertising, film, and other discourse.

This course has three specific objectives: 1) To enhance the ability of students to analyze and critically evaluate the persuasive content of a variety of environmental "texts" (including environmental policy speeches, advertising, news stories, etc.); 2) To increase student awareness of environmental issues and the way that groups define and present these issues to public audiences; and 3) To empower students to take action on environmental issues, if they desire, by improving their writing, discussion, speaking, research and critical thinking skills.

This course satisfies requirements for the Environmental Studies Major.

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 101 or COMM 103 or permission of instructor.

### COMM 348: Mass Media and Children

The goal of this course is for students to gain an understanding of the use and effects of mass media in children's lives.

Anxiety surrounds the topic of children as media consumers. In this course, we will examine the social psychological context of children and media consumption, through the merging of scholarship from child psychology and media effects. Through readings, discussions and films, we will look at such topics as children's cognitive ability, age differences in the understanding and comprehension of television messages, individual differences that make media effects more likely, and how media effects occur. Further, we'll assess both intended and beneficial effects of media consumption as well as unintended and potentially harmful effects. This class will employ a social scientific approach to exploring the question of media effects, with representative research being read and discussed.

The objectives of the course are to provide students with an understanding of the theories and research that inform our knowledge of the effects of mass media on children; to assist students in acquiring the ability to apply theories of media effects to current issues involving children; to enhance students' critical reasoning and use of social scientific evidence to support conclusions about the effects of mass media; and to assist students in becoming more critical and educated media consumers.

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 103 or permission of instructor

### COMM 356: Communication Research

Upon graduating from CSB/SJU many of you will find yourselves in promising careers in public relations, advertising, marketing, business; or continuing your education in graduate programs. In such positions, you will be expected to create or to read communication research reports and respond appropriately to those reports. This course is designed to provide you with a set of tools that may be used to accomplish those tasks. The specific goals of the course are: a) to introduce you to the language of social science research and to develop in you a sense of the precision of that language, b) to develop an appreciation of the many methodologies available to anyone interested in doing empirical social research, c) to cause you to think more scientifically about social phenomena, such as communication; and d) to provide hands-on experience with an actual empirical investigation of communication phenomenon.

The course content can be divided into three parts. The first third of the term will be spent examining the philosophy of social science. Second, the course will cover the multitude of research methodologies available to social scientists for answering empirical questions. The last portion of the

course will be devoted to data entry and analyses. As a group, the class will conduct an experiment and enter and analyze the data gathered using a statistical analysis software package (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences—SPSS).

**PREREQUISITE:** COMM 105 or permission of instructor.

## CORE - SENIOR SEMINARS

**\*\* All Senior Seminar Courses are offered for Standard grading \*\***

### SENIOR SEMINAR - A Core Curriculum Requirement

"The traditions of the liberal arts and the Benedictine character of our two colleges emphasize the need to develop in our students an ability to lead responsible lives in a contemporary world. This concern has always been a central element in notions about striving for a 'good life,' leading a life of civic responsibility, a life of personal integration, a life of 'wholeness.' At the junior/senior level of the curriculum, this objective implies that explicit and focused attention be paid to developing the ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. Developing this ability is, then, the goal of this program. By 'good moral judgments' we understand choices which are consciously elected and defensively maintained."

A second goal is to enhance, "the ability of students to think well about problems that resist easy solutions, problems that call for combining many separate resources and skills, both intellectual and personal."

"The aim of the program is to develop these skills:

- An understanding of the role that empirical information plays in justifying moral judgment
- An ability to sort relevant from irrelevant data
- An understanding of relationships
- An ability to assess the cogency of arguments
- An appreciation of the implications of claims
- An ability to analyze concepts
- An appreciation of and ability to use contextual thinking
- An ability to imagine vividly the impact of events and decisions upon the needs, perceptions, and desires of others
- An appreciation of emotions in the decision making process
- An ability to identify and assess normative components of issues
- An ability to clarify the relationship between an issue and one's own values"

"Issues and concerns around and through which these abilities are developed must be pertinent and persistent in the lives of both students and professors. They should be issues which broaden and deepen the scope of our concern, that increase our consciousness of connections between our lives and the rest of the world." *Taken from Exploring the Human Condition.*

The major form of pedagogy will be through discussion in all sections of senior seminar. Many faculty members will require the writing of papers and/or the completion of a final project. Each faculty member will use an interdisciplinary theme to center the class discussion. A short

description of each theme is listed after each faculty member's name.

**CORE 390-01A: Visions of the Good Life**

*Stephen Wagner 1-3-5 / 9:40-10:50 / SJU*

This course will look at some of the most prominent moral views in the tradition of western philosophical thought. Our goal will be to consider whether these views provide adequate guides for living a good life. We will look at aspects of the moral theories of Plato, Aristotle, Thomas Hobbes, John Stuart Mill, Immanuel Kant and Albert Camus. We will also investigate a number of views which claim to offer variations or alternatives to these classical western models, such as feminist thought and virtue ethics. We will use a number of literary texts in our attempt to gain moral insight, reading *The Stranger*, *The Remains of the Day*, *Their Eyes Were Watching God* and *The Plague*. As we consider whether we can find guidance for our own lives in these readings, our focus throughout will be to develop in ourselves the ability to make good moral judgments.

**CORE 390-02A: Work in American Life**

*Virginia Arthur 1-3-5 / 9:40-10:50 / CSB*

Americans work longer (2 weeks a year longer than the Japanese, the next most productive group of people) and harder than any other group. Work is a source of identity for many, providing a means of measuring their self-worth and prestige. Work can be a source of fulfillment and service to others or it can be a means of destroying self and relationships with others. Americans struggle to balance work and the rest of their life. Many yearn to find a vocation or calling in work. Americans also have complicated feelings about those who don't work; even if they understand that some people can't work they still make value judgments about those not in the workforce. Women and the few men who choose childrearing and home work have an uneasy relationship with those who have chosen to be employed while trying to raise a family.

This course will examine the meaning of work in our lives through reading and discussion. Ethical issues to be examined include: the place of work in our lives; finding meaning in work; the right to work that uses our human capabilities to the fullest and provides dignity; our obligations towards those who struggle with or can't work.

**CORE 390-03A: Moral Issues and the Arts**

*Phil Welter 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 / CSB*

While generally reflecting the society from which they come, the arts often deal with issues of moral concern as their subject matter. This course will examine the manner and effect of the arts' response to their society and to these issues and will consider their potential impact on the individual. We will read/listen to and study selected plays and musical compositions while at the same time considering various ethical systems and their application.

**CORE 390-04A: Justice in the 21st Century**

*Daniel Finn 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU*

Few issues are as fundamental to human life as justice: everyone is in favor of it. Yet few issues are as controversial: justice has different meanings for different people. This course will examine in detail six rival understandings of justice prevalent in debates today. Students will read two novels, and six philosophical or theological treatments of the notion of justice in our joint efforts to come to grips with what justice means in our lives: personally and on a national and global scale. Like all Senior Seminars, the goal of this course is to improve each student's ability to make good moral judgments.

**CORE 390-05A: Social Issues and the Law**

*Tim Robinson 1-3-5 / 11:20-12:30 pm / SJU*

What role should moral values play in our thinking about legal and public policy issues? The answer depends in part on whether we can justify our moral judgments to each other. How can that be done? What exactly are moral judgments, anyway? We approach these questions by looking at the process of judicial reasoning in criminal law, both as a potential model for moral reasoning, and as a point of intersection between moral and legal considerations. We examine particular cases and issues, as well as more theoretical questions about the foundations of ethics and law.

**CORE 390-06A: Revolutionary Lives**

*Kelly Kraemer 1-3-5 / 2:40-3:50 / CSB*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to help students develop the ability to make sound moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. We will achieve this goal by studying the moral judgments of ordinary people who have made extraordinary moral choices and taken ac-

tion to change the world. From Bono to Nelson Mandela, from Harriet Tubman to Muhammed Ali, from world famous heroes to unknown college students, we'll examine the lives, words, and actions of men and women living revolutionary lives—lives marked by and resulting in radical change. Why has an Irish rock star dedicated himself to ending poverty and AIDS in Africa? How did an ex-slave become a leader in both military and non-violent actions? Why do some people give up their time, their money, their freedom, and even their lives in the name of social justice?

The subjects of our inquiry have found thoughtful answers to some of the difficult questions facing those who seek social justice. We will examine their moral choices, discuss the rationales behind them, and pose questions: What are the alternatives in any given situation, and how does one choose responsibly among them? Would we do the same? Could we do the same? Our aim is to develop the ability to lead responsible lives in a complex and challenging contemporary world by studying the examples set by others.

**CORE 390-07A: Reading for Life**

*Tony Cunningham 2-4-6 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make good moral judgments on issues that affect our lives. Everyone loves a good story. Yet, great literature can provide us with far more than idle recreation. Stories can often provide us with rich character portraits that can reveal the subtleties and nuances of what it means to live well and responsibly. In this course we shall use novels and films to address Socrates' most basic ethical question: "How should one live?" We shall do so by attending to all the concrete, particular details of real-life and fictional characters thoroughly embroiled in the "business of living." Reading well offers the possibility of vicarious experience and ultimately, ethical insight. Unlike abstract ethical theories, this course will *not* offer a systematic, "how to" approach to ethics. Indeed, one of the things we shall discuss is how standard ethical theories like utilitarianism and Kantian ethics (the most dominant ethical theories in the Western Philosophical tradition) provide a unified, systematic view of our ethical responsibilities at the expense of ignoring or disfiguring what human beings are really like in all their complexity and beauty. This course will make an attempt to help students make better moral judgments in the sense of better appreciating the competing values that make appeals on human life. Literature and real-life experience have special powers in this vein because appreciating what *matters* is not merely a matter of engaging in an intellectual exercise in philosophical argument and analysis.

**CORE 390-08A: "The Bible says!" Biblical Ethics in American Society and Culture**

*Michael Patella 2-4-6 / 11:20-12:30 / SJU*

While the biblically based, ethical culture of New England Puritans and Dissenters has met some competition over the centuries, it still dominates much in the American political and cultural arena. Such a foundation for ethical behavior can be good, but it has all too often relied on seriously problematic interpretations of Scripture.

Is there a way to read the Bible different from the method employed by televangelism and fundamentalism? Is Sacred Scripture still valuable in forming an ethical vision for the Twenty-first Century? This seminar will research the history of our biblical culture, establish a disciplined method of biblical interpretation, and then use the Bible to address ethical and moral issues in the area of ecology, education, war, capital punishment, the economy, and sexuality.

**CORE 390-09A: Politics and Ideals in Contemporary Musical Theatre**

*Ned Dubin 2-4-6 / 2:40-4:10 (no Fridays) / SJU*

The course will focus primarily on 20th century opera and how composers and librettists responded to the political situation and ethical issues of their day, with plenty of time set aside to discuss our own views on these problems and how they affect us still. We shall study some 5 works in depth, chosen to reflect a variety of musical schools (atonality, cabaret, minimalism, etc.) and political systems and modes of protest (Hitlerism, Stalinism, civil disobedience, etc.) An enjoyment of classical music is an essential part of this course.

**CORE 390-10A: Feminism and Families: Mortal Enemies or Unexpected Allies?**

*Jean Keller Monday / 6:00-9:00 pm / CSB*

In this course, we will examine the social construction of the family by drawing on works of ethics, philosophy, social science, literature, feminist theory, and men's studies. We will examine critiques of the family by feminists, men's studies scholars and social conservatives and compare

and evaluate these respective groups' visions for a reconfigured ideal of family life in light of the question: is one of these models of the family ethically "better" than the others? If so, how do we make and justify claims of ethically better and worse?

Topics for discussion will focus on ethical issues related to the family, such as: how is family defined and who gets to define it; is there a normative conception of the family? If so, does it include single-parent families, gay and lesbian families, extended families, and families of choice--and why or why not?; what effect does and should public policy have on the family (for example, welfare, healthcare for families, childcare, paid parental leave); for many of us, our conception of the good life includes *both* work and family. How can and should these two commitments be balanced? How do gender roles shape our expectations of what this balance should look like and should gender roles be relevant to individual decisions about work and family?; How do understandings of the family vary across cultures and what can we learn from these examples as we try to envision our ideal of family life?

This course satisfies the Capstone Requirement for the Gender and Women's Studies Program. It is open to any male or female student with an interest in topics related to gender, family, and career.

#### **Core 390-11A: Ethics and Economics of Sustainable Societies**

*Ernie Diedrich Monday / 6:00-9:00 pm / CSB*

The goal of the Senior Seminar program is to develop the student's ability to make moral decisions. In this course, we analyze the ethical and economic underpinnings of current industrial societies, critique them and suggest a different foundation for sustainable societies. The topics covered include the economic and philosophical underpinnings of current market systems, a critique of these underpinnings including the flaws in neoclassical economics (epistemology, methodology, and ethics), and an evaluation of how a new paradigm might be constructed.

The purpose of this course is to decide if societies such as ours are sustainable (after we understand this idea) and suggest what a sustainable society could be. In effect, we will try the very challenging task of understanding everything about how we live and then reorganizing or rechanneling social evolution into a new pattern.

This class will be conducted with a heavy emphasis on discussion with students assuming the responsibility for getting the class started on the readings and by grappling with a topic or question (based on the readings or a previous speaker). There will be guest speakers and field trips to learn from others about the problems and opportunities of "manifesting" sustainability (real implementation).

#### **CORE 390-12A: Religion, Identity, and Conflict**

*Noreen Herzfeld Tuesday / 6:30-9:30 / SJU*

In most recent conflicts sides have been identified, whether accurately or not, primarily through religious affiliation. This course will address the role of religion and religious identity in the recent conflicts in Ireland, Bosnia, and the Middle East. Our focus will be on how the religious tenets, values, and customs of Catholicism, Eastern Orthodoxy, and Islam have shaped and influenced recent conflicts. We will examine the role of religion in forming personal identity and question how underlying religious beliefs and traditions affect one's decision making, in times of both war and peace. Have most recent wars been "religious wars"? Is religion different from spirituality? How does one's religious formation or affiliation affect one's world view, even when one is no longer an active participant in that tradition?

#### **CORE 390-13A: Communal Identity and the Moral Life**

*David Cloutier Tuesday / 7:00-10:00pm / CSB*

For much of the last few centuries, moral thought in the West focused on the individual and was concerned with methods for individuals confronting moral decisions. However, recent work in ethics has turned its attention to the way in which communal identity/identities and commitments shape our approach to the moral life. Individuals do not face moral decisions as abstract, generic agents, but as whole persons formed by gender, class, religious tradition, family, professional education, nationality, etc. This class will explore this centrality of communal formation and practice for the moral life, with particular attention paid to (1) the ways in which communities of practice provide us with stories of what a good life is, (2) the tensions between communal identity and the values of Western individualism, (3) the problems and possibilities of a multiplicity of overlapping communal identities, and (4) the particular challenges of religious identity in a secular world.

#### **CORE 390-14A: Expanding Awareness and Consciousness (without drugs!)**

*Leigh Dillard Wednesday / 6:30-9:30pm / CSB*

This course examines how our perception of reality, and ourselves, is determined by our belief-systems and how unaware we are of our own resulting biases and blind spots. The course explores different ways of thinking and knowing from a variety of perspectives (e.g., somatics, psychology, neuro-science, the arts) and includes an experiential component combining meditation, the Feldenkrais Method, creative movement and play as means for increasing self-awareness and altering belief-systems and perceptions of reality.

### **COURSES OF THE COLLEGE**

#### **COLG 130: EMT Basics**

This course covers basic minimal emergency care required to work on an ambulance or first responder squad throughout the 50 states in the U.S. The course offers basic to more advanced techniques and principles of pre-hospital, emergency care. Students must be at least eighteen years old to take the National and State Certification exams. .

### **ECONOMICS**

#### **ECON 329-01A: Asian Economies**

This course addresses the rise to significance of the Asian-Pacific region in the world economy. It examines the rise of the Asia-Pacific as an important economic, cultural, and geopolitical region. This region of the world is typified by a delicate balance between governments and business interests, which accounts for their diverse development trajectories. Moreover, this relationship is not static but dynamic, reacting and evolving with changes in internal and external circumstances. This course in Asian Economies will concentrate primarily on the post World War II growth performance of the countries in East and Southeast Asia, also known as the "Asian Tigers". It will study how these countries transformed themselves from peasant societies into industrial powerhouses and how they have continued to achieve growth rates several times higher than the advanced nations of the West over a period of time. Using basic tools of economic theory, three themes are going to be addressed. First, the different paths of development are analyzed within their regional and international contexts. Second, the relationships between the USA and some of the key countries, such as Japan, South Korea, and China, are explored. Finally, the rise to significance of this region in the global economy is examined.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 111 or permission of instructor.

#### **ECON 329-02A: Economics of Health Care**

Emphasis on the application of economic reasoning to an understanding of the health care system of the United States. Evaluation of the changing nature of health care and its consequences for the medical professions and institutions. Analysis of public policy for provision and financing of health care.

PREREQUISITE: ECON 111

### **ENGLISH**

#### **ENGL 220: Topics in Research**

This course will focus on the theory and practice of research in literary and cultural studies. As a class, students will conduct research on three types of literary/cultural texts before they venture into their own topics. The texts will include a historical novel (e.g., *Ragtime* by E.L. Doctorow, or *The Invisible Man* by Ralph Ellison), a short series of films, and some form of resistant/subversive culture (hip hop, perhaps, or prison literature). With the guidance of the professor, students will then research and write a paper on a subject and topic of their choice. This course is an excellent preparation for an honors thesis in the humanities.

#### **ENGL 355: STUDIES IN INDIVIDUAL AUTHORS: Protest and Possibility in the Writing of Tillie Olsen and F. Scott Fitzgerald**

At first glance, Tillie Olsen and F. Scott Fitzgerald seem like the oddest of couples to harness together in one course. Fitzgerald named the Jazz Age of the 1920s and recorded and lived its excesses. Writer Patricia Hampl calls him and his wife Zelda "proto jetsetters," who flitted around the U.S. and Europe, always looking for the next party. Fitzgerald was also a prodigious worker, writing 178 short stories, five novels, and many magazine articles.

Tillie Olsen, on the other hand, was born in 1913 to poor Russian Jewish immigrant parents. Olsen dropped out of high school to help support her family, and during most of her writing life, she held down a string of low-paying jobs, raised four daughters, and wrote around the edges of the day. Olsen and her husband Jack were blacklisted in the 1950s for their membership in the Communist Party and their work for labor unions. During her long life (Olsen is 90 years old) she wrote a slim collection of short stories and novellas, one novel, and *Silences*, a powerful description of the forces that enable or stifle writers.

In spite of these vast differences, I see a fascinating link between Olsen and Fitzgerald. Olsen's work has always protested all "that will not let life be" for marginalized people in the U.S., people who are largely invisible in Fitzgerald's stories. But as Hampl says, Fitzgerald was "a great and grieving critic" of cold-blooded American capitalism, not a defender or celebrator.

To explore this and other connections, we will read all of Olsen's writing and a selection of Fitzgerald's fiction and essays. We'll also read biographical, historical, and critical commentaries. Each student will do several pieces of independent research and present them to the class.

This course may be applied to the Gender and Women's Studies Minor. Gender flag is pending.

### **ENGL 385-01A: Revolutionary Texts: The Histories and Literatures of the Mexican Revolution**

*Christina Tourino & Brian Larkin*

*This course is Cross-listed with HIST 300*

This course explores the Mexican Revolution through texts from the disciplines of History and Literature. Students will read five Mexican novels that narrate the Mexican Revolution, along with five texts of History on the subject. The goals of this course are three-fold. First, students will learn about what happened during the Mexican Revolution. Second, students will explore the ways in which the disciplines of History and Literature overlap. Third, and perhaps most importantly, students will learn to practice historiography and literary criticism. We will grapple with questions such as: How have the disciplines of History and Literature developed? How can one event be viewed differently over time? How does the historical setting of the historian impinge upon the history written? In what ways does narrative strategy relate to content? What perspective can we gain by reading diverse narrative efforts (historical fiction, testimonial, high modernism) at opening up the contradictions and silences of "official" versions of real historical events?

### **ENGL 385-02A: Studies in Literature: Men's Lives in Literature and Film**

*Charles Thornbury*

This course examines the diversity and complexity of the male experience in modern America with an emphasis on how males themselves experience their lives. We will consider not only literary approaches but also sociological, historical, and psychological views. In order to understand how men change over time, the course examines their experience from youth to old age. We will pause at critical stages — being a son and brother, experiencing rites of passage into manhood, discovering sexualities, relating to men and women, pursuing careers, becoming a father. We will read primarily American authors: Ernest Hemingway, Ralph Ellison, Arthur Miller, Tim O'Brien, and Paul Monette. The movies range from classic westerns such as *Stagecoach* and *Unforgiven* to other depictions of men and masculinity in *Deliverance*, *Philadelphia*, *Glengarry Glen Ross*, *The Full Monty*, and *American Pie*. Requirements: reading journal, participation in class discussion, three papers: one on fathers and fatherhood (based on interviews and readings), an analysis of one or two works in depth, and one paper on a theme in men's lives.

**PREREQUISITE:** Completion of an HML literature course and Sophomore standing.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES**

#### **ENVR 395: Research Seminar**

Capstone seminar for Environmental Studies majors/minors; intensive research project and formal presentation in collaborative setting. The Spring 2004 topic will be green design and environmentally sustainable building techniques. Prerequisite: senior standing or permission of instructor.

### **GEOLOGY**

#### **GEOL 380: Geologic Hazards**

Geologic Hazards (floods, earthquakes, landslides, volcanic eruptions) are always with us, even when we are not personally threatened by such events. We are exposed to a constant stream of news reports of the impacts of geologic hazards, and developing an understanding of these events is important if we are to be informed citizens. This course will explore the underlying causes and potential mitigation of geologic hazards.

### **HISTORY**

#### **HIST 118: History of Islam**

This class will focus on the rise of Islam in Arabia and its diffusion into the Middle-East, Central Asia, and South Asia. We will study how Islamic societies emerged from the confluence of local traditions and classical Islam, and also study the three large empires that this society produced: The Ottomans in Turkey and South-eastern Europe, the Safavids in Persia, and the Afghans and Mughals in India. To understand the social, cultural, and political changes that occurred in Islamic societies during 600-1500 CE we will study the history of Islam from many different perspectives: nobility, scholars, Christian crusaders, peasants, Sufi leaders, women, as well as communities on the borderlands of the Islamic world.

#### **HIST 200: Inventing the Conquest of Mexico**

Students will examine the Spanish conquest of the Aztec Empire from 1517-1521 from multiple perspectives to develop a deeper understanding of the historian's craft. Texts will include firsthand accounts of the conquest by Hernán Cortés, the captain of the intrepid band of Spanish adventurers, by Bernal Díaz, a foot soldier in Cortés' army, and by anonymous Aztec Indians who lived through the fall of their empire. Students will also read later historians' interpretations of the conquest and its consequences for Mexico. Discussion in various formats will serve as the primary class activity, and students will be asked to write a number of short and medium length essays for the course.

#### **HIST 300: Revolutionary Texts: The Histories and Literatures of the Mexican Revolution**

*This course is Cross-listed with ENGL 385*

This course explores the Mexican Revolution through texts from the disciplines of History and Literature. Students will read five Mexican novels that narrate the Mexican Revolution, along with five texts of History on the subject. The goals of this course are three-fold. First, students will learn about what happened during the Mexican Revolution. Second, students will explore the ways in which the disciplines of History and Literature overlap. Third, and perhaps most importantly, students will learn to practice historiography and literary criticism. We will grapple with questions such as: How have the disciplines of History and Literature developed? How can one event be viewed differently over time? How does the historical setting of the historian impinge upon the history written? In what ways does narrative strategy relate to content? What perspective can we gain by reading diverse narrative efforts (historical fiction, testimonial, high modernism) at opening up the contradictions and silences of "official" versions of real historical events?

#### **HIST 329: Colonialism and Culture: Everyday life in the British Empire**

How did the experience of Colonialism impact the life of ordinary men and women throughout the British Empire? This class attempts to study this issue by examining the political debates, popular culture, changing legal codes, and literary accounts of life in India, Africa, and Britain during the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. We will examine both the ideological underpinnings of imperialism, but also examine the ways in which it changed ideas about race, culture, gender, and national identity.

Texts for the class will include scholarly books, as well as fictional works like Rudyard Kipling's *Kim*, films, speeches, advertisements, and political pamphlets. These texts will reveal the profound impact that colonialism had in the shaping of modern social and political institutions throughout the empire, and its direct impact on the shaping of national identities in Britain, Africa, and India.

#### **HIST 389: Historiography and Methods: History One Person at a Time**

How can you understand the mind and feelings of a person living in a radically different time? What can we say we "know" about the individual in history? How much of a person is captured in a diary or autobiography? How can we understand individuals through the material artifacts of

their lives? History too often generalizes about groups; this course takes the opposite tack and looks at how you can see both unique personality and whole cultures in the individual. Our purpose is to understand how to write history well, to appreciate and analyze individual motivation, and to make sense of the past. In short, it explores the art of biography.

We will look at sources on some very obscure people (using, for example, interviews with ex-slaves and letters home written by a pioneer woman) and also sources on some major political figures, such as Malcolm X and Richard Nixon. In the process, we will 1) explore the different ways historians can get under the skin of individuals in the past through exploring the uses and limits of letters, diaries, memories, autobiographies and interviews; 2) analyze one life in depth, the life of Malcolm X, to understand the different selves presented in his autobiography, speeches and reactions of his contemporaries; and 3) compare the biographies of an individual (which students choose to concentrate on), so that they can see how historians come to vastly different conclusions about the same person using the same evidence. Although most of the sources we examine will be printed, students will also have the opportunity to read handwritten manuscripts from the 1800s and examine past material culture.

This is a small seminar in which discussion will be the heart of the class. Students will read a variety of texts and will write several short papers and one extended comparison of different books on the same individual.

## **HONORS**

### **HONR 210: Science and Medicine: East Meets West**

Modern science, which developed only in the West, has profoundly changed our culture and is the theoretical basis for modern medicine. Ironically, Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) is becoming increasingly popular in this country even as we have completed the sequence of the human genome. In reality, few people have an understanding of the historical development either of science or medicine, which are inexorably intertwined. In this course, we will broadly compare and contrast the history and practice of science and medicine in the West and in China and how they evolved differently. We will probe how cultural differences (religious, philosophical, legal, linguistic, psychological, etc.) affect the methods we use to explore and understand our world as well as our definitions, diagnoses, and treatments of disease. Initially, we will study the rise of science in the West, from ancient Greeks through the "scientific revolution" and enlightenment to the present. Next, we will study the history of science in China and why modern science did not develop in Asia. Next we will review the history of Western medicine, followed by the study of the theory, diagnosis, and treatment in TCM (including 5 Element and Yin/Yang Theories, acupuncture and herbal medicine). Finally, we will construct a synthesis of both medical traditions based on a modern understanding of mind/body interactions. Laboratory experiences will help students study the nature of the modern scientific "method" and the properties of molecules

### **HONR 220-01A: Politics of Diversity: New Immigrants and Refugees in Minnesota**

*Manju Parikh*

This course will focus on the changing demographic trends in Minnesota. It draws on the importance of understanding diversity in our current context of increasing globalization and interdependence. It will analyze the conditions which promote immigration to the United States, and examine the specific circumstances which brought the Hmong, Vietnamese, Somali and Mexican & Hispanic communities to Minnesota. The course will also deal with the impact of their presence in the economy, society, culture and politics of Minnesota.

### **HONR 220-02A: Introduction to Economics**

*Ernie Diedrich*

Want to know why market systems operate the way they do and why China, Cuba and North Korea are reluctant to play along? Curious about why the poor always seem to be among us...and in such large numbers? Ever wonder what the song of a lark might be worth or why people are catching fewer fish? Is globalization good for the planet? This introductory economics course addresses these and other issues and along the way, you'll learn about economic theory, how it has evolved, and how it applies to every facet of our lives. You won't learn to organize your wallet (as Woody Allen thought a course on Economics was about), but you'll get a very good grip on analyzing and understanding the problems of our times. We'll use a text, two books, some movies and the internet in our work. Bring your curiosity!

### **HONR 230: Music and Creativity**

MUSIC AND CREATIVITY is a music course with strong interdisciplinary aspects. It will study (1) the creative process through a book by Anthony Storr; (2) the life and work of one particular composer through a biography; (3) ten major musical works through listening, lectures and demonstrations; (4) at least one major artistic period, including its musical, visual, literary and theatrical arts through lecture, video presentations, research papers, class discussion; and (5) live music performances through attendance at musical events as well as in-class performances, with written critiques and group discussions.

### **HONR 240: The Development of the Christian Tradition.**

An introduction to the discipline of Christian theology with a substantial focus on select themes and texts of the scriptures. Attention is also given to the method of theological study and to the development of the Christian tradition since Biblical times. Students will be introduced to Biblical languages, especially Hebrew, and will learn to think critically both about the Bible and about modern theological controversies.

### **HONR 250-01A: Philosophy & Gender**

*Jean Keller*

In this class, we'll examine philosophical conceptions of femininity and masculinity in the history of western thought. Our aim thereby is two-fold: to understand the philosophical significance of gender and to better understand today's conceptions of gender and sexuality by understanding how these conceptions have been promoted and/or contested by important thinkers throughout history. Probable topics include: feminism; men and gender; what is meant by equality; the organization of the family and its role in political life; sexuality; friendship.

### **HONR 250-02A: Great Poets for Life**

*Fr. Mark Thamer*

This honors course will feature such great world poets as Jalauddin Rumi, Pablo Neruda, Rainer Maria Rilke, Shakespeare and the Poet of the Book of Job as well as modern classic poems by writers like Sekou Sundiata, Li Ch'ing-chao, Michael Ondaatje, Margaret Atwood, Claribel Alegria and Carolyn Forché. In many cases, classical and modern musical compositions which feature these authors' poems will be played and discussed in class for the purpose of refining students ability to understand and interpret poetic texts. Students will be asked to learn by heart several of their favorite poems or parts of poems which ring most profoundly for them, for, as poet Molly Peacock writes, "Each time any of us reads a favorite poem, it conjures up a special sorcery of second sight and third and fourth, until understanding is so profound that we are returned to a state before we even had language... That is why it is so hard to say exactly what a poem means. Yet how rare – and thrilling – to be struck dumb in the all too articulate world." The purpose of this course is to allow students not only to explore and to understand, but also to be struck dumb in the face of some of the world's greatest poetry. Students intending to take the Great Books course their junior year will find this course a helpful preparation. ### **HONR 250-03A: Ethical Thinking in Global Perspective**

*Nick Hayes*

*This course is pending a HML designation*

Engages students in an discussion of perspectives of contemporary authors on crucial global issues. The authors and topics include: Abraham Verghese on HIV/AIDS, Arundhati Roy on the U.S. war on terrorism, Philip Gourevitch on genocide in Rwanda, Tim O'Brien on the legacy of the Vietnam War, Andrei Maxine on the memory of Stalinism, Hannah Arendt on the Holocaust. The format will combine informal evening discussions with special guest presentations and campus events.

### **HONR 311: Great Books/Great Ideas**

This is a year-long discussion based seminar that concentrates on some of the world's greatest works of literature, philosophy, and intellectual history. Authors may include Aristotle, Augustine, Austen, Biblical writers, Camus, Confucius, Descartes, Dickens, Dostoevsky, Eliot, Faulkner, Freud, Homer, Zora Neale Hurston, Henry James, Joyce, Kafka, Kant, Melville, Toni Morrison, Flannery O'Connor, O'Neill, Plato, Sartre, Seneca, Shakespeare, Shaw, Virginia Woolf, and others. Registration is by permission of the instructor only. Interested students should e-mail the instructor. All students in this course purchase a personal library consisting of roughly 100 books, and students are required to read a number of novels and plays during the summer.

## **HONR 320: Why War?**

*Jeff Anderson*

Sigmund Freud, in response to a letter from Einstein, states that we loath war "because everyone has a right to his own life, because war puts an end to human lives that are full of hope, because it destroys precious material objects which have been produced by the labors of humanity." In this course, we will explore the fundamental causes of war from a variety of perspectives. Sifting through theories of war from political science, psychology, economics, sociology, anthropology, and biology, we will attempt to identify those with potent explanatory value. To enhance this disciplinary-based analysis we will also partake of a judicious selection of literature and films on war. Specific topics we will cover include: the nature of aggression (instinctual v. learned), group thinking, problems of misperception, balance of power, the military-industrial complex, arms races and sales, environmental theories, imperialism, and systemic explanations.

## **MANAGEMENT**

### **MGMT 323: Consumer Behavior**

This course examines the process of consumer decision making in regards to motivation, personality, lifestyle, attitudes, and cultural and social influences. There will be an emphasis on the use of research and theory in developing marketing strategies. Prerequisites: MGMT 321

### **MGMT 353: Management Information Systems**

This course covers the conceptual foundations of MIS, the various types of computer-based information systems and their roles in businesses and other organizations, and societal issues related to information systems. Particular attention will be paid to understanding the relational-database structure underlying modern information systems and the information systems tools that managers use. Prerequisites: MGMT 241 and one upper division management course.

### **MGMT 380: Applied Strategic Management**

Management majors can fulfill their experiential learning requirement while studying abroad by completing this course. A series of readings on international management topics will be assigned and students will be expected to submit written work electronically. These writings will require reflection upon and integration of management theory with the experience of international living.

## **MODERN AND CLASSICAL LANGUAGES**

### **FREN 352: La Fille ainee de l'Eglise**

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 368*

The first European nation to accept the Roman Church, protector of the papacy and leader of the Crusades, whose monarchs were the first to rule by divine right as God's representatives on earth, the land of "one king, one law, one faith", France was also the country that promulgated the ideas of the Age of Reason, overthrew its king and set up a republic, separated the state from the Church, to become what is today one of the most secular nations in the west. We will trace the process by which this came about, with an emphasis on the intellectual history of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries, through readings in literature, politics, theology, sociology, philosophy, etc. All texts, papers, discussions in French.

### **GERM 355: Insiders/Outsiders: Exile and Return**

As in all dynamic societies, certain groups in rapidly changing German society were shunted aside because they lacked specific traits deemed necessary by the mainstream. The critical view of the social center afforded by a marginalized position can set up a dynamic of socio-cultural conflict, struggle, and eventual change. This course explores those patterns of exclusion portrayed in literary works, individual lives, documents and art from selected episodes in German history from the Reformation to Reunification. Literary figures such as the gypsy queen Courasche; reformers Martin Luther and Dietrich Bonhoeffer; writers Kafka, Thomas Mann, and May Ayim; Afro-Germans and Gastarbeiter; the Holocaust and *die Wende*--all embody the notions of exile and return. Gender flag pending.

**PREREQUISITE:** GERM 311 or 312.

### **MCLT 368: Reading Biblical Women**

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 368*

An exploration of the Bible as sacred text, cultural document and literary masterpiece, with special attention to the women of scripture. In addition to close readings of texts such as Genesis, Exodus, The Song of

Songs, the Gospels and Revelation, class members will become acquainted with a range of techniques of biblical and literary analysis, from historical and textual criticism to mysticism and feminist theory. In the final unit of the course, students will explore, as interpreters and creators, artistic responses to scripture (the study or creation of translation, stained-glass, theatre, poetry, mystical writings, prose fiction, etc., based on the biblical text).

## **PEACE STUDIES**

### **PCST 368: Religion, Society and Politics**

*This course cross-listed with CORE 369*

Recent developments in the United States and other parts of the world have led observers to look closely at religious groups' beliefs and activities concerning the state, society, and sociopolitical issues like cultural diversity and war and peace. In this course we will examine the Judeo-Christian tradition and address such questions as: What is the relationship between religion and ethnicity and religion and nationalism? What is religious fundamentalism? How do various groups view their relationship with the state and the broader society? What kinds of social and political goals do religious groups have and how do they try to achieve them? We will try to answer these and other questions through the study of historical and sociological case studies and selected religious texts reflecting the range of belief and practice in the Judeo-Christian tradition.

### **PCST 399: Capstone**

Sen. Paul Wellstone said "full participation in our democracy is an essential aspect of citizenship and is crucial for the success of our democracy". Community organizing, the process by which people freely choose to come together to pursue a common purpose, is a fundamental element of democratic participation. This course will help participants gain an understanding of community organizing as a process essential for building peaceful communities and learn to evaluate the variety of courses of action available for making social change. We will study theories and methods of organizing; examine and compare organizing experiences of different communities; analyze the historical development and changing practices of community activism; and pay particular attention to the effects of race, ethnicity, and gender on organizing strategies and practices in all of these areas.

## **PHILOSOPHY**

### **PHIL 368-02A: Vulnerable Lives**

*Anthony Cunningham*

Who can deny that human lives and character are fragile? Even a quick glance at victims of rape, genocide, war, oppression, betrayal, and tragic loss suggests that ultimately we are all vulnerable. Yet, down through human history various lines of thought have suggested that this need not be so. For instance, various Eastern religions have held out the promise of relief from suffering through enlightenment. The Judeo-Christian tradition has often pointed to faith and divine grace as a balm for suffering and a shield against the same. Some Roman and Greek schools of thought have aimed at forms of detachment and serenity that could render human beings invulnerable. Using sources from psychology, memoir, philosophy, fiction and film, we shall consider some ways in which human lives and character can be compromised and disintegrated. We shall also consider strategies designed to render us less vulnerable or even invulnerable. And finally, we shall consider whether such strategies hold out any promise and whether they might carry their own price for beings like us.

## **PSYCHOLOGY**

### **PSYC 393: Psychology Seminar (Contemporary Issues: Evolutionary Psychology)**

Psychology Seminar involves detailed consideration of a special topic and requires the preparation and presentation of a major paper to seminar participants. This section, "Contemporary Issues: Evolutionary Psychology," is designed as a capstone course to help senior psychology majors integrate diverse psychological concepts, principles, theories, and methods through critical examination of landmark studies and contemporary scientific and professional issues and controversies in psychology. Topics will be drawn from most cognate areas of the discipline, including biological foundations of behavior; sensation and perception; consciousness; learning; memory; cognition; intelligence and testing; motivation and emotion; human development; personality; stress, coping, and

health; psychopathology; psychotherapy; social psychology; research methods; and professional ethics. Special emphasis on evolutionary theory.

**PREREQUISITE:** Senior standing and 20 credits in psychology

## **SOCIAL WORK**

### **SWRK 380: Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation**

This course is a study of sexual orientation and gender identity from the perspective of individual identity development. The course will also explore the impact of families and communities on the lives of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender youth and adults. Responses to prejudice and discrimination toward sexual minorities will also be explored.

## **SOCIOLOGY**

### **SOCI-337: Reading the Indigenous Pacific**

The course introduces students to the study of the Pacific (Oceania) and Pacific Islanders through contemporary indigenous literature and scholarship. Issues such as colonialism/postcolonialism, rootedness versus routinized, and identity will be discussed. Writers such as Tongan essayist/novelist Epeli Hau'ofa, Samoan novelist/poet/playwright Albert Wendt, Maori novelist/short-story writer Patricia Grace, and others will be studied. Grading will be based upon class participation, an assigned research paper, and two oral exams with annotated bibliographies.

## **THEOLOGY**

### **THEO 309-70A: Religion and Politics in Homer and the Hebrew Bible**

*This course is cross-listed with CORE 359-70A*

Images and stories about God or the gods shaped the imaginations of the people of Greece and Israel and have had a profound impact on Western civilization. This course will compare the numerous divine images in Homer's Iliad and Odyssey with those in the Hebrew Bible and examine the ways in which religious language and beliefs shaped the political and social life of these ancient communities and continues to do so in communities shaped by the Jewish and Christian traditions.

### **THEO 339: Suffering & Christian Healing**

Human suffering and Christian healing are considered in both social and personal dimensions. The ministry of the contemporary Christian church as it reclaims the ancient Christian grace of healing is explored from several perspectives: historical, literary, psychological, scientific, social and theological.

### **THEO 339: Spiritual Companionship**

*Diane Millis*

This course will introduce participants to the ministry of spiritual companionship. They will explore the growing need for "soul friends" in contemporary life and consider the various contexts for cultivating spiritual community: one-to-one, small groups, marriage, family life, place of worship, and the workplace. Participants will apply companionship skills to their own lives through course assignments and class activities such as role-plays, discussion of case studies, and reflection on personal experiences.

### **The Rise and Fall of Philosophical Liberalism**

Classical liberalism holds that governments exist to protect the rights of individuals. Primary among those rights is liberty, the right to be free from interference by others. Liberalism provides the philosophical foundation for democracy, civil liberties, and free-market economics. This Senior Seminar will explore the development of philosophical liberalism as it arose in England from the 16<sup>th</sup> century onward.

We will begin the semester by reading some of the sources for the classical political theory that liberalism supplants. We'll examine sections of Plato's *Republic* and Aquinas' *Summa Theologica*. The Natural Law of Aquinas, the great synthesis of Aristotelian philosophy with Christianity, provides a philosophical foundation and justification for the political synthesis of Church and State that dominates Europe and England from the Middle Ages to the Early Modern period.

European thinking—about politics, about religion, about science—changes significantly from the early 15<sup>th</sup> to the middle 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. During this time, the classical synthesis breaks down and the roots of liberalism: individualism, democracy, individual rights, freedom of conscience, civil liberties, and market capitalism emerge. Much of our reading will concentrate on this period.

The foundation of liberalism can be found in the two great 17<sup>th</sup> century English philosophers Thomas Hobbes and John Locke. It is fair to say that a full understanding of Hobbes and Locke must situate their thinking in two historical and cultural contexts: the rise of early modern scientific empiricism (particularly Bacon and Galileo), and the political and religious turmoil of 17<sup>th</sup> century England. We will spend substantial time examining the philosophical and political thinking of Hobbes and Locke within the historical and cultural context of 17<sup>th</sup> century England.

Hobbes, witness to the English revolution and the beheading of his former student Charles I, looks to a scientific understanding of politics (the "invention" of political *science*) as a solution to anarchy. Although certainly no defender of political liberty, Hobbes sets the stage for early liberalism with his discussion of individuals, self-interest, natural rights and natural law, and a social contract between citizens and sovereign.

In replacing Aquinas' teleological and religious understanding of "natural law" with a scientific understanding of the "laws of nature," Locke discovers the God-given "natural rights" of life, liberty and property. With the restoration of the British monarchy in the later 17<sup>th</sup> century, such revolutionary ideas get branded as treasonous and Locke flees England for Holland. While in Holland he writes the *First Letter on Toleration* and begins work on his *Two Treatises on Government*. With the ascension of the Dutch William of Orange in 1688, Locke returns to England where he publishes the *Two Treatises* and remains as political and economic advisor to the King until his death.

We next will read the moral and economic writing of another British citizen, the Scottish philosopher Adam Smith. While Locke's discussion of private property will begin our examination of liberal economics, it is Smith's "invisible hand" that provides the classic rationale for free markets. Smith argues that if we grant certain philosophical assumptions about individual human nature, about rationality, and about value, a particular social and economic arrangement (the "free market") granting individuals maximum economic liberty will result in the greater overall social good. Again, we can best understand this philosophy by situating it in its philosophical, cultural, and historical context, in this case 18<sup>th</sup> century Britain.

We then will turn to 19<sup>th</sup> century British political thought, examining the development of the progressive liberalism of the utilitarians Jeremy Bentham and John Stuart Mill. The rise of the British Empire and industrialism during the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> century provides the backdrop for our study of the utilitarian version of liberalism. We will plan a visit with Bentham, where he resides at the University of London, as we start reading his work. Finally our semester will close by reading the great 19<sup>th</sup> century critic of liberalism, and London resident, Karl Marx. We will do a walking tour of "Marx's London" as part of our class.

# CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS

The purpose of the Core Curriculum is to provide students with a foundation and the intellectual tools necessary to examine the fundamental, recurring questions about ourselves and our world. These questions challenge students to broaden their interests and explore a variety of academic areas. Striving to ask those questions well and make good moral and ethical judgments about them is at the heart of our colleges' mission.

**The Core Curriculum is composed of four levels of requirements:**

## 1. Proficiency-based requirements

Foreign language proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in speaking or reading a classical or modern language through satisfactory completion of the language proficiency exam or through satisfactory completion of Modern/Classical Language 211 (with any passing grade).

Mathematics Proficiency

Students demonstrate proficiency in elementary algebra and geometry through satisfactory completion of the mathematics proficiency exam or calculus readiness exam.

First Year Students beginning Fall 2001 must complete the Fine Arts Experience requirement by attending 8 designated Fine Arts Experience Events—four events per semester.

## 2. Cross-Disciplinary courses

First-Year Symposium (2 courses)— CORE 100 & 101, or HONR 100 & 101

Senior Seminar—CORE 390, or HONR 390 only. Education majors can complete EDUC 390 and SWRK majors can complete SWRK 390. Ordinarily completed during Senior year. Cannot be repeated for credit. Both semesters of First-Year Symposium must already be completed.

## 3. Disciplinary courses

Only courses which are designated within the course title by the appropriate symbol (FA, HML, MT, JC, etc) may be used to complete the following disciplinary requirements.

FA	( 4 credits)	Must be from courses that are designated as fulfilling Fine Arts
HML	( 2 courses)	Must be from different departments or disciplines ( ex. Not two literature courses even if they are from different department)
TH	( 1 course)	Must be 100 level theology course.
HMU	( 1 course)	Must be from the same discipline as one HML or TH already completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
JC	( 1 course)	May be satisfied only after the TH and one HML course is completed. Cross listed courses only fulfill either the HMU or the JC, but not both disciplinary requirements.
MT	( 1 course)	Must have satisfied the Math Proficiency before the completion of the course.
NS	( 2 courses)	Must be from different departments (unless NATS, COLG, HONR or ENVR).
SSL	( 1 course)	Must be 100 level.
SSU	( 1 course)	Must have completed the SSL course first.

## 4. Flagged courses

Courses may carry 1 or more flags, in addition to meeting Core disciplinary or Major requirements. Flagged courses are specific to the instructor and term. Flagged courses are listed in the Class Schedule and updated lists are posted at the Office of the Registrar.

#### **MATH 124: Probability & Statistics (MT), 4 credits**

**Faculty Moderator - Phil Byrne**

**Dates:** May 10 through June 24, no classes on Memorial Day

#### **COLG 280: New York Music and the Arts, 1 credit**

**Faculty Moderators - Robert Koopmann and David Paul Lange**

**Dates:** May 11 through May 20

A ten day course in New York City, focusing on concerts, art exhibits, plays, musicals and architecture. Classes give historical background and develop critical skills. Three on campus classes before departure.

**Approximate Fee for trip:** \$1,500, which includes tuition, round-trip plane fare, housing, tickets for events, city transportation, and two group dinners.

#### **COLG 280: Rome & Florence: Arts & Ideas, 1 credit**

**Faculty Moderator - Mark Thamert**

**Dates:** May 12 through June 2

Perhaps no other city in the world gives witness so vividly to artistic movements and counter-movements as the city of Rome. This course will introduce students to the art, architecture, music and intellectual history of the Classical, Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque periods of the eternal city.

**Approximate Fee for trip:** To be announced

#### **POLS 396: Washington DC Internship, 8 credits**

**Faculty Moderator - Kay Wolsborn & Charles Rambeck**

#### **SPAN 112: Beginning Spanish II, 4 credits**

**Faculty Moderator - Jose Fabres**

**Note:** Course will be taught by qualified Spanish professor on site

**Spanish 112** is the second in a series of three lower-level language courses. Emphasis remains on promoting language proficiency in listening, speaking, and writing, with background information on the cultures of Spanish-speaking peoples. Class time is devoted mostly to the development of listening and speaking skills.

**Prerequisite:** SPAN 111

**Approximate Fee for trip:** \$2,100

#### **SPAN 200: Intensive Intermediate Spanish II, 8 credits**

**Faculty Moderator - Jose Fabres**

**Note:** Course will be taught by qualified Spanish professor on site

**Spanish 200** is an accelerated Spanish language course that covers the thematic and linguistic content of Spanish 112 and 211 in five weeks abroad in Valladolid, Spain. Spanish 200 carries 8 credit hours, will likely have a global flag, and meets four hours a day (Monday-Friday: 9:30-12:30 plus an hour of conversation in the afternoon). It is the equivalent of taking two courses, plus passing the course will fulfill the CORE requirement!

**Approximate Fee for trip:** \$2,100

#### **SPAN 211: Intermediate Spanish, 4 credits**

**Faculty Moderator - Jose Fabres**

**Note:** Course will be taught by qualified Spanish professor on site

**Spanish 211** is the third in a series of three lower-level language courses. Emphasis remains on promoting language proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing, with information on the cultures of Spanish-speaking peoples. Students will expand on vocabulary and grammatical structures presented in 111 and 112 to communicate meaningfully, effectively, and with an increasing amount of fluency and creativity. This course fulfills the core foreign language requirement.

**Prerequisite:** SPAN 112

**Approximate Fee for trip:** \$2,100

**The program may also offer the following courses in May 2004:**

#### **SPAN 310: Advanced Grammar, 4 credits**

**SPANISH 310** is a review and advanced study of Spanish grammar designed for students who already have taken 212. While the emphasis of the course is on practical usage, theoretical concepts will also be considered when necessary. The course will also concentrate on selected contrastive aspects of the structures of English and Spanish and the study of problematic vocabulary items as they relate to the grammatical component.

**Prerequisite:** SPAN 212 or permission of instructor.

#### **SPAN 311: Spanish Conversation, 4 credits**

**SPANISH 311** is designed to consolidate and elaborate on oral skills attained in previous courses. Emphasis will be on creative, meaningful and well structured oral expression. Students will develop discussion skills. Discussion will be based on selected topics and literary and cultural readings in order to put into practice the reading and literary skills developed in 212. In addition, students will continue their study of Spanish grammar and a component of writing practice will be introduced.

**Prerequisite:** SPAN 212

#### **SPAN 312: Spanish Composition, 4 credits**

This course is designed to help students improve their command of written Spanish. It also includes practice in oral expression, oral presentations, and daily debate. Written assignments will be based on a step-by-step approach to the development of writing skills. Writing topics will be related to short literary and cultural readings. These readings will be incorporated thematically and according to the writing styles presented in class. The course will also provide a systematic review of Spanish grammatical structures and troublesome lexical items. The grammar will be integrated with the material studied in class.

**Prerequisites:** SPAN 212 and 310 or 311
